Ghosts in the Wings?

Theatre folk are a superstitious lot. We wish our colleagues "break a leg" instead of "good luck." We never mention the title of "the Scottish play" in a theatre (I won't even write its name here). We do not whistle backstage. Productions of plays with ghosts in them traditionally attract misfortune, but when the Chair Actors decided to stage a rehearsed reading of ghost stories drawn from plays, poems and short stories, we didn't think we were tempting Fate.



Our last show, about early Sechelt pioneers, was titled *Restless Spirits*; I liked the theme of "spirits" continuing from one show to the next. Ed White had long wanted to perform an eerie little story by local author Dick Hammond, "The House by the Talking Falls," based on a haunting occurrence his dad Hal Hammond had related. Lifelong professional actor and new Sandy Hook resident Martin Evans offered to abridge the Dickens classic, *A Christmas Carol*, and to read its tales of the Yuletide ghosts.

We planned to find material for a dramatic or comic reading for the other half of the show. *Ghost Stories* seemed as good a title as any.

A few days before our first rehearsal I was on my way home from the Vancouver Public Library, armed with play scripts about the supernatural, when my car was rammed by a young driver. It was a write off and I was feeling very sorry for myself.

In production week, another person had to leave the show when a close family member was failing. Martin fell ill with a dreadful cold and nearly fainted in his Dickens costume on opening night.

Coincidence? Jinx? Ghosts at work? Whatever the explanation, I take my theatrical hat off to all the dear Chair Actors. "The show must go on," and it did. Our next show is *Blithe Spirit*, the Noel Coward comedy about a writer whose first wife returns to haunt him. It's a co-production with Driftwood Players and will run at Gibsons Heritage Playhouse and here at the Seniors Centre next April. Take that, fickle Fate.
