appy New Year to all! 2024 was a prosperous year for the SSAC, and 2025 looks to be equally prosperous. We are in a strong financial position, owning the building and land with an assessed value of \$2.74 million and a mortgage of \$123,420.42 which we intend to discharge at its maturity at the end of July 2025. We currently have approximately \$100,000 in the general revenue account and \$77,632.73 in the contingency account. A recent comprehensive building inspection revealed no major concerns, although there were several minor items requiring our attention. A massive thanks must go to Bob Maveety, who has dealt with each of these issues, and is making up a maintenance schedule to ensure that we keep on top of building maintenance. If you do notice any maintenance related issues, please let us know at the front desk.

As previously mentioned, our popularity continues to grow as evidenced by our membership numbers; currently there are approximately 1,700 active members. By "active" each member has accessed our Centre for activities or food service, in the past year and a half. We have a space committee looking at some possible solutions to make the main entrance less congested at peak times.

Wednesday, January 15 Mike Healey Professor Emeritus, UBC, Vancouver

"Geomancy, Dragons, and the art of the Japanese Garden"

Japanese gardens are renowned for their beauty and elegance, as well as their apparent natural qualities. The best gardens capture the essence of the six features of a perfect landscape: artfulness, seclusion, spaciousness, antiquity, waterways and borrowed scenery. Dr. Healey's presentation will explore a number of famous Japanese gardens and discuss how these six elements are incorporated in each.

Wednesday, February 19 Eric Gorham Professor Emeritus, Quest University Squamish, BC

 $"How \ to \ Interpret \ the \ News"$

Dr. Gorham will look at biases more insidious than "liberal/conservative" contributing to the decline of the mainstream media. He will also give tips on where to find a variety of reliable news sources and political ideas, and how to critically examine political news stories from both mainstream and non-traditional sources.

Wednesday, March 19

Eric Verspoor, Professor Emeritus, University of Highlands and Islands, Inverness, Scotland

"Fish Clans of Scottish Lochs and their Evolution after the Last Ice Age"

About fish and chips, Dr. Verspoor's talk highlights new insights into cryptic biodiversity In freshwater fish, and how it evolves. The knowledge is gained from studies of Scottish lochs, exploiting modern methods of molecular analyses of DNA variation and the increasing computational power of computer chips.

Wednesday, April 16 Shauna Butterwick Professor Emeritus, UBC, Vancouver

"Teaching Old/new Dogs (and their humans) new tricks: The Brain on Art"

Different parts of our brains are active when engaging in art making, be it doodling, collaging, painting, poetry or related pursuits. This leads to new opportunities for learning and healing. Dr. Butterwick shares research on how art-making leads to healing/learning and shares stories of her experiences as an educator working in community and formal educational institutions.



Professor Emeritus Christine Pawley presented a fascinating talk about Charles Dickens' A Christmas Carol and how changes in the 19th Century affected his writing. Over 65 people attended and generously donated \$350 for the Affordable Lunch Fund.

Memory Café

When Memories Are Lost

t's hard to imagine a life without the memories we've gathered over the years. Our careers, our travels and adventures, dear friends and cherished members of our families. They anchor us to who we are and who we were, and when that anchor gives way, we are left to drift in a confused sea of fear, embarrassment and isolation.

According to a 2012 Statistics Canada survey on Disability, more than 600,000 individuals, or 2.3 percent of Canadian adults, suffer debilitating memory loss from various causes. Among the challenges many of them face is isolation, which, in turn, can lead to anxiety, depression, and an increased risk of dementia.

In the early days of a person's memory loss, the necessity of support systems is not always apparent, but developing a familiarity with a place and group of people at this time will prove invaluable during later stages. Thanks to the Sechelt Seniors Activity Centre, such a support system is available through **Memory Café**, a weekly program that provides persons with memory challenges, accompanied by a loved one, with an opportunity to join with others who are coping with similar difficulties.

Held every Tuesday morning from 10:30 to 12:30 at the Activity Centre, **Memory Café** begins with an hour of seated yoga, led by Certified Yoga Therapist Bobbie Seale-Cobiskey, followed by a social hour. As they snack on cookies and a hot beverage, participants share their latest news, funny or inspirational stories, and play games that more often than not have everyone laughing. Every other week, local musician Vicki Beeman leads the group in a sing-a-long of old songs. Occasionally, group outings are arranged to places such as the Sunshine Coast Botanical Garden and the Tide Pools Aquarium, a picnic in the park or a local concert.

Mary Basas, whose mother was once an active participant and has recently passed, wrote that for them, "Memory Café was a place where Mama felt a lot of joy amongst friends. It also became my weekly happy place especially when watching her interact and have fun."

Thanks to the generosity of the Activity Centre, the cost of participation (currently \$6 per couple), is more than affordable. Membership in the Sechelt Senior's Activity Centre is required, but this comes with its own bucket of benefits, including an affordable lunch among friends and a diverse selection of activities and supportive programs for seniors.

It takes a special kind of courage to acknowledge that you need help, and even more courage to take the first step towards getting that help, but once taken, doors begin to open, and a burden once carried alone begins to lighten.

Fundraising Lottery

Sunshine Coast Seniors Online 50/50

et a chance to win big while helping Seniors on the Sunshine Coast! We announced at the Fall General Membership meeting about plans for a Sunshine Coast Seniors Online 50/50. We can now confirm its launch on January 1st, 2025! Its purpose is raise funds for the SSAC to aid in reducing food insecurity and social isolation for Sunshine Coast seniors by providing affordable nutritious meals and accessible transportation.

In September 2023 we launched the **Affordable Lunch Program** at the SSAC. Chef Emily and her assistant Liz have worked hard to produce delicious meals at an affordable price. However, despite Emily's frugal purchasing of food items, the price of the meals crept up to inflationary pressures. This program aims to keep prices of our lunch entrées at either \$10 or \$12 and frozen we kept the price of frozen takeout entrees at \$6 and \$8. The program has been an overwhelming success, with members in more fortunate circumstances donating funds. The demand on the frozen entrées has risen dramatically, illustrating the enormous need for producing affordable meals.

We have recently hired an extra sous chef on a part-time basis to keep pace with the demand for frozen entrées. We welcome Jackie Coombs into this role and the greater SSAC family. The extra cost of this position was the impetus to think about how to raise more funds to expand the production and supply of affordable meals to keep pace with the needs of our members. Thus, the Sunshine Coast Seniors Online 50/50 was conceived. Tickets are going on sale for the first monthly draw. Deadline for ticket sales is 11:59 pm on Wednesday, January 29th. The draw draw will be on Thursday January 30th at 9:00 am. Twelve monthly draws will be held in 2025, with ticket sales deadline at midnight of the last Wednesday of each month.

Social isolation is a burden for many seniors, esp. those who are disabled or no longer drive their own vehicle. There is dire need for more accessible transportation on the Sunshine Coast. The Handydart service through BC Transit is insufficient, due to the many demands made upon it, and there are very few alternatives.

It was reported in the 2024 BC Seniors Advocate that in BC, there was a 45% increase in Handydart ride requests and an 11% reduction in rides fulfilled. We aim to help our members who require accessible transportation to attend Centre or other events. To this end, a proposal to purchase a wheelchair accessible van - a 2024 Ram 2500 ProMaster Smart Floor Wheelchair Accessible Van from Dynamic Speciality Bus Sales, Surrey, BC, was made at the Fall General Membership meeting. The vehicle can carry a driver and co-pilot plus 8 passengers, or by removal of seats, can accommodate from 1 to 4 wheelchairs with a rear door electric lift. A motion was passed at the meeting that the van purchase can proceed if we raise \$20,000 from the Sunshine Coast Seniors Online 50/50 by March 2025. Funding for this proposed purchase is supported by a \$5,000 grant from the Sunshine Coast Credit Union and a \$4,500 grant from a national competition for TELUS Seniors Health and Wellness Fund. We heartily thank both organisations for their support. This money was used towards a \$10,000 refundable deposit on an accessible van which will be available at the end of January 2025. The purchase will be completed at that time, provided the appropriate funding has been secured from the 50/50 lottery.

Tickets for the online 50/50 will be available to anyone in the province, so we want to promote it as widely as possible, especially to younger generations. The site will show the jackpot total as it accumulates. The bigger the jackpot, the more appealing it will be for purchasers around the province.

On January 1st we sent out an email reminding our members of the lottery opening, along with the link to the page where tickets can be purchased. We would appreciate it if you could help promote the lottery by passing on the email or link to anyone in your own social media network. If you would like to buy tickets but do not wish to buy online, we will have a volunteer at the Centre to assist in the purchase, using a dedicated handheld device. The success of this lottery will determine how many seniors will benefit from our our initiatives.

\$1 BINGO is held on Tuesday afternoons from 2:00 to 4:00 pm with reduced price of game cards. The 10-game packs are \$10 and single extra sheets are \$1. The progressive game sheets will stay at \$2 with the first game prize being \$200 (48 balls called). 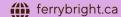

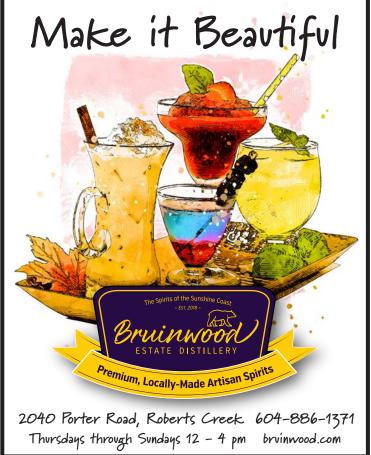
