# Managing to **Move Forward**

elcome to all our members new and old enjoying all that we have to offer. As I have previously recounted, we have grown tremendously in recent years both in number of members and complexity of operations. Treasurer Alison Kowalewski and I, as

President, will be ending our terms after four and three years of service respectively, in March 2026. Going forward, it would be unreasonable to expect a volunteer board to have the expertise or ability to commit the time needed to orchestrate everyday operations and carry out strategic planning for such a large organization. The Board has voted unanimously to hire an Executive Director and plan to advertise the job posting in July with the aim of having the successful candidate in place by October. The successful candidate will need to be a person with a strong record of non-profit institution management but who also understand the needs and sensitivity of working with Seniors. The Board concluded that we are in a strong enough financial position to move forward with this hiring for an initial one-year period. Having an Executive Director will also facilitate effective fund-raising via grants, sponsorships and donation programs to help mitigate the cost of the position and to keep membership and activity fees as low as possible.

The Global TV coverage of our Centre and the Affordable Meal program had an incredible impact on the June 50/50Jackpot, elevating it to a total of \$14,075. If we can maintain or even increase this amount each month, we will be well placed to keep the prices low and service the demand for our frozen and in-house meals. With the increase in production of frozen meals we are running out of freezer space. However, the Sunshine Coast Credit Union (SSCU) has come to the rescue with a \$5,000 Community grant to cover the cost of an industrial quality freezer. We applied on May 10th and were notified of the granting on June 23rd. We thank the SSCU for their tremendous commitment to the community.

The SSAC has the most important role of safeguarding the interests and serving the needs of our members. However, it is also important that we give attention to needs in the greater community. For instance, we have been able to assist Pender Harbour Better at Home this year by suppling a biweekly order of frozen meals. As well, in the last 3 weeks, we were able to supply the Sechelt Nation with frozen meals on an emergency basis until they can return to their usual food supply.



We had a wonderful Volunteer Appreciation lunch on Friday, June 27th. Emily, Jackie, Liz and their incredible volunteers produced an amazing buffet and were thanked by a welldeserved raucous round of applause at the end.



The Appreciation lunch is one of the most important dates in the calendar. The SSAC would not run without all our amazing volunteers. I particularly want to give a welcoming thank you to four members who have stepped up as much needed new dishwashers in response to the midmonth blast urgent appeal.

So many of our volunteers at the SSAC also volunteer their time at other organizations. In that vein, in addition to being our Manager of Operations and Engagement Gillian Smith is an avid community volunteer for Friends of the Sechelt Library, among other venues. So much so that she was one of this year's Frances Wasserlein Community Leadership Award winners. It is awarded to a community member on the Sunshine Coast who has made significant leadership contributions as a volunteer to arts and/or cultural events in our community. Congratulations to Gill from all of us for this very deserving award.

couple of shows in November. It was wonderful to have the old gang back together (after Covid threw a wrench in things for a couple of years) and it felt so good to be back on our most familiar stage.

Those that know me well know that there isn't anything I enjoy more than singing, with dancing being a very close second. I have performed on many stages over the past 25 years or so, but none have ever felt like "home" to me more than the stage at the SSAC. Maybe it's because I have done so many shows here over the years, or perhaps it's more about the amazing people I have met, and became dear friends with.

My friend Karen and I love to sing together, and both always wanted to work with seniors, in some capacity. We love the warm fuzzy feelings we get when we sing the "oldies", and see the smiles on audience members' faces.

# Thank You for Your Generosity

e are continually grateful for the generosity of our members as evident from the amount of funds gifted to our donation programs.

As of June 27<sup>th</sup>, 2025, the totals for the three programs since September 1<sup>st</sup>, 2024, are as follows::

Affordable Lunch program	\$18,333
General Revenue	\$31,036
SSAC Endowment Fund	\$26,465

#### (+\$1000 donor contribution this year)

We are well on our way to our target for the Affordable Lunch Program of \$25,000. This does not include proceeds from the online 50/50 which are totally committed to support food service costs and production of affordable meals. We will continue to try to keep food prices at their current level in the coming year. The bigger we can build the monthly Jackpot the more we can support and hopefully expand the affordable meals program.

The General Revenue program continues to be a vital source of funding to help us meet ongoing maintenance and replacement costs.

We hope to see the Endowment Fund with the Sunshine Coast Foundation continue to grow over the years with legacy and in memoriam donations.

The Endowment fund does deliver a constant flow of funds each year, with a grant being made to the SSAC based upon interest earned throughout the previous year. This year we received a grant of \$974 based upon the \$26,465.27 in the fund as of December 31<sup>st</sup>, 2024.

Thanks again to all our donors as we continue to make the Centre the best it can be for our members and ensure its long-term future. •

# Global TV Story Ignites 50/50

ecause there is no government financial support for the SSAC, we mainly rely on membership and activity fees as well as donations to support our programs. The online 50/50 lottery was initiated this January to help maintain our food services, geared towards seniors in the community. The problem with a province wide online 50/50 is stimulating sales with only a small promotion budget. We contacted Global TV news at 6 team with our story in February. Huge thanks to Brian Coxford (SSAC member and former Global TV journalist) for keeping in constant communication with them. On Thursday June 12<sup>th</sup> it happened! Aaron McArthur and his cameraman Sergio arrived to film the story. They took copious videos in the kitchen and around the Centre, and interviewed Chef Emily and President Richard. When the story aired on the News at 6 on Monday June 16th it had an immediate effect on the 50/50 sales as it resonated

with viewers around the province. One Burnaby viewer was so moved that she phoned in and made a direct donation of \$1,000 to the Affordable Lunch program.

The Jackpot in May was \$2,280, however in contrast, when the June draw was made the Jackpot was \$14,075, which benefitted greatly from the broadcast. The \$7,038 prize was won by Jay Biddle of Langley Township. It is heartwarming to witness how many ticket buyers from around all of BC were moved by our cause to participate. If we can sustain or build this jackpot even higher each month, we will be able to maintain the low prices, increase food production and make inroads towards food insecurity in our community. Thank you to all those who bought tickets especially those off the Coast who have connected with our cause.

#### Eric John Zasburg

#### December 19, 1935 - June 22, 2025

In his 90<sup>th</sup> year, Eric finally ran out of his "9 lives" and died peacefully at home, enveloped by love with his devoted wife, Eleanor, by his side.

Born to Ebba Westergaard and John C Zasburg on December 19, 1935, in Calgary. Eric travelled in his cradle in a boxcar of possessions to a bush farm in Northern Alberta in



spring '36. His idyllic childhood there was shattered when his father went to war in September '42, and his mother died of TB in March '43.

Cared for by two maternal aunts for 2 1/2 years, Eric, at age 10, came alone by train to the West Coast in June '46, where his father, then returned from war, first arranged for Eric to live with a foster family in Hilliers, Vancouver Island; then with him and his newly arrived war bride first in Cedar by the Sea, after in North Wellington. These early experiences of upheaval and abandonment made Eric a homebody, where he kept the fires burning with his finesse at cutting, chopping, and piling wood.

Eric graduated from Nanaimo Secondary School, and there began what became his life's work - working in land survey, first for BC Hwys Dept., then for private surveyors. He married Carol McIntyre in June '60 and made a home with her in Yellow Point, relocating to Vancouver to study at UBC for an Arts Degree. Eric first worked on the Sunshine Coast in summer '64 and later divorced, and separated from a second relationship moved to Sechelt permanently in 1972.

In retirement, Eric, a man of quiet presence, became a 25-year volunteer for The Hospice Society, appreciated for his steady warmth. He was always a ready and willing helper, and to all his friends. This man of few words developed into a writer of memoir and short stories that were vivid, moving, and accomplished. Eric met his enduring Love, Eleanor Mae (nee Thomsen), in mid-life, and they shared 47 years, marrying on April 21, 2008, to celebrate 30 years together. They travelled in their Volkswagen Camper and later their car, making many trips across the Prairies to Manitoba to see family, and around BC and Alberta. They became active in the community, volunteering for the Sunshine Coast Arts Council. There were many good times and celebrations with friends.

Eric will be forever missed by his soulmate, his loving wife, Eleanor. He also leaves to mourn half-sister Pam Bartram (Bob), nephew Wade, and Eleanor's large and extended family, in particular, sister-in-law Carol Brown (Dale) and their family. Dear friends too, who loved and respected Eric will miss him.

He was a good man, playfully called "Uncle Eric" by some. He will be remembered and treasured by Eleanor with much love and held in the hearts of all who knew him. A Memorial will be held at a later date.
