elcome to another exciting month at the Centre.
As succinctly put in the title, we are at a
crossroads. As I've indicated before, we have
experienced tremendous growth for the last
couple of years. Our membership is up, to over

2000. With it we have had to deal with issues related to space, food services, and the ability to provide adequate activities to service all our members. As I previously have reported, the Board unanimously agreed that there was the need to hire an Executive Director. We have indeed interviewed candidates for the position and hopefully very shortly we will be announcing that we have been able to hire an extremely well qualified candidate for the position.

The hiring of an Executive Director marks a significant shift in our leadership structure. It will shift the organization from being led by an Operational Board of Directors to a Governance Board.

This means the Board will no longer be directly responsible for the day-to-day management of the staff, programs and services but will instead focus on governance functions such as setting strategic direction, establishing policy, ensuring financial accountability, and upholding the organization's mission. As a result, the President's role will evolve from overseeing daily operations to leading the board in its governance responsibilities, facilitating effective decisionmaking, and maintaining a strong working relationship with the Executive Director. The Executive Director, in turn, will assume responsibility for the overall management of the Centre, including supervising staff and volunteers, overseeing programs and services, managing finances within the approved budget, and implementing the strategic goals set by the board. This structure ensures a clear separation between governance and operations, strengthening accountability and organizational effectiveness. However, this governance change will not change our joyous and supportive environment that you, the volunteers, staff and Board have created over the past years.

With our Board itself there have been changes. We are very pleased to congratulate Mark Garland on his promotion by the Board to the open Vice President's position. This leaves two Director-at-large positions open. We are asking for members to come forward who would like to have a say in how we are run and fill these roles until the elections that will occur at the **Annual General Meeting** in March 2026. If you are interested in being nominated for one of the positions, please contact me at president@myssac.com.

On October 29<sup>th</sup> at 1:30pm we will be holding the **Fall General Meeting**. Please make a point of attending so that you can learn about future plans and can have the opportunity to voice your opinions to the Board.

Thanks again to our wonderful staff and volunteers that have created the success that has necessitated our governance change that will lead to greater efficiency and sustainability in the operation of the Centre. Have a great September! •


## Precious Metals Roadshow Returns to Sechelt

Ursa Major Gold, Silver & Coin returns to the Sechelt Seniors Activity Centre on September 29<sup>th</sup> and 30<sup>th</sup>. You can bring your gold, silver, coins and collectable banknotes between 10am and 4pm on Monday or Tuesday. No appointment is required. Barry Dick is a precious metals buyer and President of Ursa Major Gold, Silver & Coin.

"Ursa Major has the unique advantage of dealing direct with a smelter" said Dick. "That allows us to cut out one or even two middlemen. Ursa Major purchases gold and silver from other gold buyers, pawn shops, dentists, jewellers and jewellery makers as well as the general public." In terms of the US dollar, gold and silver prices appear low but the weak Canadian dollar means prices are strong.

Ursa Major analyzes your gold, silver, coins and paper money while you watch, with the process explained to you in detail. Coins with numismatic value are graded and set aside from those with a 'melt' value. Silver items such as jewellery and flatware are analyzed for hallmark identification. Items thought to contain gold will also be analyzed for hallmarks, and then confirmed using precise testing that is done while you watch. Then a cash offer is made and you decide to sell or not.

"If you decide to sell after hearing the quote, great, but it is also about information" says Dick. "A lot of times people just need to know a ballpark of what things are worth; we don't pressure anyone into selling". Dick took out his first gold claim when he turned 16 in the 1970's and has been involved with precious metals ever since. An ardent gold panner, he was a regular



at the world championship gold panning competition with a personal best of 3rd place in 1984.

"Nearly half of the world's annual gold harvest comes from recycled gold. Energy costs are about \$500 to mine a new ounce of gold where recycled gold is about \$10 per ounce. That prevents a lot of diesel from being burned." Gold and silver purchased at the show and later melted goes back into the market without incurring that environmental cost.

Out of fashion jewelry, single earrings, broken chains, unloved jewelry, charm bracelets, dental gold, nuggets and fine gold are all accepted. "We can assess any coin ever made for collector or precious metal value, including world coins and ancient coins." People are encouraged to bring in any and all coins for assessment.

Ursa Major also assesses and purchases Canadian and Dominion of Canada Paper Money. They have extensive experience working with estates, executors, widows and widowers in a respectful and caring manner. No appointment necessary.

#### Dr. Edward Frank Berinstein

#### August 27, 2025

Dr. Edward Frank Berinstein died peacefully on Wednesday, August 27th, 2025, surrounded by his loving family. He is survived by his beautiful wife of 48 years, Mariette, his three beautiful daughters, Stephany (Oliver), Nicol (Will), Rachel (Mike), his three beautiful grandsons,



Cohen, Oscar, and Morrie, his beautiful Sister Roxy (Martin) and his beautiful brother Neil (Corinne). He is also survived by numerous nieces, nephews and cousins.

Dr. Berinstein was born in Winnipeg and graduated from the University of Manitoba's School of Medicine in 1972. After completing his internship in Toronto, he joined the University of Manitoba's Northern Medical Unit in Churchill, Manitoba. It was there that he met his wife and soulmate, Mariette. Together they spent three years in northern Manitoba and then accepted a position in 1976 at the Pender Harbour Health Centre on the Sunshine Coast.

In 1980, Dr. Berinstein joined the Gibsons Medical Clinic and, for the next forty years, practiced full-service, cradle-to-grave medicine. This included office practice, emergency room work, obstetrics, anesthesia, nursing home visits, palliative care, and house calls. He was Medical Director of the Sechelt | shíshálh Hospital for many years and a founding member of the Sunshine Coast Division of Family Practice. He was also the physician representative on the Sechelt Hospital Foundation board for many years.

Dr. Berinstein was instrumental in starting a palliative care service here on the Sunshine Coast and, upon

retirement, spent time on the Sunshine Coast Hospice board, bringing his medical and palliative care experience as well as his passion for seeing a free-standing hospice facility on the Sunshine Coast. During all this time, he was a dear and much-valued member of the Sunshine Coast Medical community.


Dr. Berinstein was introduced to mindfulness meditation when he first arrived on the Sunshine Coast, and in the 1990s began hosting meditation groups in his home. In the early 2000s, he received further training, based on the work of Jon Kabat-Zinn, and began facilitating Mindfulness-Based Stress Reduction (MBSR) workshops through the Roberts Creek Community School Association, the Sechelt Mental Health Centre, and privately. He later co-facilitated for many years, along with another physician colleague, Rahul Gupta, the eightweek MBSR program. Over the years, hundreds of people have attended these programs and have benefited greatly.

Dr. Berinstein was a gifted athlete, excelling in hockey and baseball. He was the goaltender for the University of Manitoba Bisons from 1965-68 and represented Canada in the World University Student Games in Turin, Italy in 1965. He continued his goaltending career here on the Sunshine Coast, and many times the fans in the stands could be heard chanting ED-DIE, ED-DIE, ED-DIE.

Above all else, Dr. Berinstein was a family man and cherished his beautiful and loving wife, children and grandchildren. They were everything to him, and he transmitted to them the guiding principles of his life, kindness and love. He will be greatly missed by his loving family, close and extended, his friends, near and far, and the community at large.

Janis was a member of the Seniors Centre and loved Yoga and the Crazies. Survived by son Eric and her daughter Christine and her little puppy Theo.




